Rooted in action: Tree Aid at COP

The team was busy during climate conference season, both hosting and speaking at events to build support and unlock barriers for the communities we work with.

A standout moment was receiving the Global Centre on Adaptation's Local Adaptation Champion Award for our work on food security in Burkina Faso. Community leader and project participant Awa Convolbo was there to accept the award, reinforcing how international decisions shape lives on the frontlines of the climate crisis. The 16th UN Convention to Combat Desertification (COP16) addressed critical issues like land degradation, drought resilience, and sustainable land management. We highlighted the importance of empowering Sahelian communities to combat desertification and advance the Great Green Wall.

We also launched two new reports evidencing our work and the need for funding to reach communities on the ground at a much quicker rate.

COMPLETED PROJECT: GROWING FOOD AND INCOMES IN BURKINA FASO

This project directly supported women, young people, and internally displaced people (IDPs), who often face the greatest risk of hunger and poverty.

Here, participants established nutrition gardens and learned how to grow and care for moringa and baobab trees. This has boosted their ability to withstand climate and security shocks with sustainable and diverse food production. The project has further supported IDPs by providing emergency treebased food kits, sourced from project groups, to enhance the food and nutritional care of both displaced individuals and their host communities.

Since 2017, we have been working with communities in Burkina Faso,

where poverty and hunger are widespread issues. During the long dry months, people struggle to grow enough food. Children often suffer the effects the most, with mothers being forced to rely on non-nutritious foods like maize to feed them.

One-third of the country's farmland is already degraded due to the effects of the climate crisis and deforestation – the clearing of trees for things like farms. This is making it even harder for people to grow enough crops to eat and sell to earn an income.

But at Tree Aid, with the amazing support from people like you, we've seen some incredible results that are supporting communities and the environment.



UNDERSTANDING TREE AID'S WORK WITH INTERNALLY DISPLACED PEOPLE

Every year, hundreds of thousands of people in and around the Sahel region of Africa are forced to leave their homes because of growing insecurity, conflict, and extreme weather caused by climate change. Many settle in communities already struggling with poverty and hunger.

Displaced people, including internally displaced people (IDPs), are among the most vulnerable in the world. They have often lost their homes, livelihoods, and sense of safety. Many face long, difficult journeys with little access to food, clean water, or sanitation, leaving them more likely to fall sick or get

injured. Even after reaching a new place, life remains tough. They often lack food, shelter, income opportunities, support networks, and access to basic services like healthcare.

In response, Tree Aid is working with an increasing number of IDPs and addressing their needs by providing emergency food kits made from tree produce to help families feed their children.

We work with both the IDPs and the host communities, enabling them to work together so that they can integrate and create safe, secure and happy lives. We support IDPs to access land and learn how to grow nutritious food for their families.



COMPLETED PROJECT: PROTECTING FOREST GOVERNANCE IN MALI

This is what the project has achieved:

Over the last three decades, nearly two million hectares of forest have been lost from Mali, mostly to make space for farmland – this is known as deforestation. The Ségou region of Mali has been hit particularly hard by deforestation and the effects of the climate crisis.

With rainfall becoming more unpredictable, and soil losing its fertility, people are struggling to grow trees and crops – something which they depend on for food and income. As a result, over half of Mali's population live in poverty.

This three-year project improved governance in four communes by involving more people in decisionmaking. It focused on empowering women in forest management, supporting them to protect natural resources. The project has restored land, improved soil, and supported local farming. It also introduced sustainable charcoal production, reducing environmental damage and promoting eco-friendly jobs. Additionally, it helped 400 Village Tree Enterprise members increase their incomes and build stable businesses for the community.

Rabeca mentions that she is proud of the efforts the Tree Aid delegation carried out at the summit, bringing international visibility to our mission on alleviating poverty and tackling the climate crisis through restoring nature. Having a community member as the face of our delegation reminded people why we do the work that we do and how

decisions made at the international level directly impact those at the front lines of the climate crisis.

She is hopeful that looking ahead to the new year, COP30 in Brazil presents more opportunities to further protect nature and community livelihoods. Rabeca said, "The Tree Aid delegation made a huge impact at COP29, spotlighting the urgent challenges faced by the drylands of Africa and presenting our solutions through land restoration. Our community member, Awa, stood out as a true climate champion, inspiring action with her dedication and voice!"

We were beyond proud to be back at COP where at the conference, we were awarded a Global Centre on Adaptation Local Adaptation Champion Award! We received recognition for our efforts in food security in Burkina Faso. Awa Convolbo, a community leader supported by one of our projects, was there to receive the award.


